Grades 10-12

Listen carefully to the story *Who Speaks for Wolf?* This story has been used for thousands of years by the Iroquois People to teach lessons essential for their survival.

Your exam question is to explain, in five paragraphs, what the story teaches you about "Native Perspective." This is a wide open topic. Basically, I'm asking you, what did you learn from this story? You may want to write about what the story teaches about man's relationship to nature. Do not ask me if what you are writing is okay. I have no specific answer that I am looking for. All I expect is that you think deeply and write clearly.

Remember: if you do not have a clear thesis topic that you tie into the second, third and fourth paragraphs, you will fail this exam. Make sure each of your paragraphs relates to your thesis! If you just repeat the plot of the story without any analysis, you will fail the exam.

Part Two

Answer each of the following questions in a short paragraph.

1. What does the central fire symbolize?
2. Why are beans, squash and corn called "sisters"?
3. If you were about to make an important decision for your community, what would it mean to consider, "Who speaks for wolf?"

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
